Pray that God would give them peace of mind as they perform this very stressful and demanding job that we have elected them to do. Pray that they would be led by the Spirit to make wise decisions. 

The SOUL Kitchen board is looking for more churches who would be interested in cooking and/or serving. If you have not heard of the SOUL Kitchen, it stands for Serving Others with Unconditional Love. We serve a meal for the community every third Wednesday of the month from 5:30 to 6:30PM at the Nazarene Outreach Center. This meal is free for whoever comes. Each month, we need a cook team to prepare the meal and a serve team of 8 to 10 volunteers to help serve. This is not a buffet style set-up. We serve them at their tables as well as get drinks and dessert for them. This is a great opportunity for your church or youth group to serve the community.

If your church has two or three people who are willing to serve as a cook team, they can come and see how it is done before they sign up. We have people who are willing to help them on their first time as well.

If you have a group who is willing to volunteer, we would need 8 to 10 people the night of the meal as well as for your church to provide desserts for about 100 people. This can be pies, cakes, cookies, or whatever you would like. Between prep and clean up, your group would be there from about 5:00 to 7:00 PM.

You can serve as volunteers even if you do not have a cook team. We have a couple of cook teams who are willing to do it as needed.

As of now, we have someone covering February, May and September. The months we are looking for volunteer groups are March, April, June, July, August, October, November, or December. If you would like your church to be involved on one of these months or if you have any further questions, please let me know at reviyoung.naz@gmail.com. Building for the Future (The Sequel). It's February 2019, so that means that our annual internal missions' project will be the Trinity scholarship fund. During February, the Missions Committee (Chair Kathy Bastian), working with Memorial Ministry (Chair Paul Murphey), will be seeking your prayers and financial support (honor gifts) for our church's scholarship fund that directly benefits Trinity youth and adults as they seek higher- and continuing education. This internal missions' campaign allows two church committees to work closely to promote a very important ministry that assists our own members (professing, baptized, and regular attendees as determined by Memorial Ministry).

Our current invested scholarship account, monitored & managed by Trinity Memorial Ministry, has a balance of \$8,026.87. It is probably no secret to anyone that an education of any kind can be costly, and Trinity has a long commitment and history of both financial support and encouragement for our students of all ages. No matter how valuable an education may be, some students simply cannot afford the financial impact to continue or to start their educational journey.

2019 Wish List Item Update. Trinity has been, for a long time, short on bulletin board space, as the church receives numerous community and neighboring church postings on a regular basis. Both the Trustees and Memorial Ministry approved the purchase of additional and replacement boards for the church. Two 6 ft. x 4 ft. boards will be placed on the blank wall in the East entrance hallway (above the hallway pew). One board will be for church use, and the Trinity Sunday School department will use the other board. Two matching 2 ft. x 3 ft. boards will be placed at the East entrance and the South entrance (by the offices) to replace the two boards currently in that location. The total cost, minus the installation charge, will be approximately \$410 and paid by Memorial Ministry funds. We will hope to have this project completed during February. Our two old entrance boards will be reinstalled in a second floor classroom.

Trinity's Mission Committee has designated the Richland Community Food Pantry as its January Mission Focus. Here's a report of 2018 activities of the Food Pantry.

In 2018 the Food Pantry served 6,231 Richland County residents. The federal government requires that the Pantry record the ages of those who are served. The Pantry served 3,368 adults, age 18-59, 54% of the total served; 1,035 seniors, age 60 plus, 17%; and 1,828 children, age 0-17, 29%. Grant agencies are especially interested in the number of seniors and children, who are provided food, as these are "targeted groups." Forty six percent of the local Pantry's 2018 clients were in these groups.

Each week, on Wednesday, the Pantry provides food to an average of fifty families. By the time they leave the Lighthouse Chapel, each one has received an average OF SIXTY POUNDS OF FOOD. This means that the Pantry sends about 3,000 pounds of food into the community *each week!*

The Pantry obtains food from a variety of sources. Several community members make donations each week. They just walk into the Chapel and deliver what they have collected. Occasionally I bring food from Trinity that has been placed in the Pantry basket by the East entrance. Kwik Trip, both locations, supply donate food each week that is picked up on Wednesday by a Pantry volunteer. Periodic purchases are also made from Kwik Trip. Two federal agencies—the United States Department of Agriculture and The Emergency Food Assistance Program—provide food on at least a monthly basis. The USDA items are delivered to the Lighthouse Chapel by a truck operated by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. This truck also makes deliveries to schools along its route. The TEFAP food is often picked up in Dodgeville at the Southwest Community Action Program headquarters. There is some concern how long the food will continue to arrive from these agencies during the present government shutdown.

The greatest source of donated and purchased food Is the Second Harvest Food Bank of Southwest Wisconsin, based in Madison. Volunteers place a weekly order that is delivered via a semi on Wednesday morning. A volunteer crew of four men meets the semi and moves the food inside the Lighthouse Chapel. There other volunteers are at work setting up and stocking the tables for the late afternoon, 4:00 to 5:30, food distribution.

In order to provide this food, the Richland Community Food Pantry needs about \$40,000.00 per year. All of this is provided by donations! Approximately eighty percent, \$32,000.00, is spent on food purchases. Second Harvest charges just eighteen cents per pound for most items. That means that each donated dollar can be leveraged into five and one-half pounds of food. Each week Second Harvest donates a large amount of produce and bread products, which go out the door that afternoon.

I thank Trinity members for their ongoing support of the Food Pantry. The Pantry shared the 2018 special Thanksgiving Offering with the Free Clinic. It will also receive contributions via the Mission Committee's January Mission Focus. Just make your check to Trinity and write food pantry in the memo line. THANK YOU!!

WORSHIP COMMITTEE:

EASTER OFFERING: We reiterated that this would go into the Pastor's Love Fund.

EASTER 2019: We made several decisions regarding Lent & Easter.

- There will not be an Ash Wednesday service, because the last two were very poorly attended. Pastor Wiley will
 combine the placing of the ashes into Communion on Sunday, 3 March 2019,
- There will not be a Maundy Thursday Service. We did not have one the past two years.
- Pastor Wiley will participate, again, in the Schmitt Lenten services and will encourage attendance.
- There will be a Community Good Friday service in the evening, sponsored by the Richland Center Ministerial Association.
- · Donna Bower will again arrange for the Easter flowers. No Easter lilies will be requested.
- Pastor Wiley "may" lead a Wednesday evening study during Lent. Both congregations would be invited to participate.

UNITY QUARTET: The Quartet has been rehearsing in Trinity's choir room on Sunday evenings. They have asked if they could leave their equipment set up in the choir room between rehearsals. We agreed that they could do so, but will note some alerts. If the Sunday School children will be rehearsing in the Choir Room, we advise that they move their equipment into the closet. Likewise, if there is going to be a wedding, during which some of the wedding party use the Choir Room as a dressing room, they will be asked to move their equipment into the closet. We noted that Paul Murphey will need to be notified to move "his" tables and chairs into the Rummage Room. We will request payment by the Quartet periodically performing during our worship service.

CHURCH COUNCIL:

Pastor Wiley opened our meeting with a prayer.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Trinity's Lydia's House campaign reached a total of \$2,011.24! That's double our pledge. Peace raised about \$2,400.00. Our ministries are alive and well.
- Tora Perkins has been employed and on staff for several weeks as our Nursery attendant. Thanks, Tora!
- Kitchen water leak update: John reported that Jeremiah Storer will be working on the leak within the next few
 weeks. In the meantime, the hot water remains turned off.
- · The Study Group is awaiting a contact from DS Carlson about a next meeting.

NEW BUSINESS:

- Lenten Schedule: please refer to the Worship Committee notes for the schedule.
- Unity Quartet use of Choir Room. Again, please refer to the Worship Committee notes.
- EZRA year end reports due to Pat by Jan. 25. These are reports that are transmitted to the Conference. Most of the reports are already in and the rest should make the deadline.
- Bulletin Boards for the East hallway: Paul Murphey will purchase these large boards from Walmart. The Memorial Ministry is underwriting this expense from undesignated memorial funds.

REPORTS:

- John Storer, Trustees. Wallace Electric has been contracted to install a hard wired doorbell for the front door.
 Attempts to use a wireless bell have fizzled. We had offered our empty shed to Bill Twining, who had a friend who could use it. That friend no longer wishes to have it. We will offer it to an area high school for a homecoming bonfire in the fall.
- Rosie Steinmetz, Camping Coordinator. Rosie has received booklets with this summer's camping schedule. Some
 will be placed on the tables in the Narthex. Pastor Wiley will talk about camp during the Children's Time. There is
 \$3,650.00 in the camping fund. Trinity pays 2/3 of the cost of a camp. Rosie noted that camping fees have risen
 rapidly the past few years and that the camping fund could be used up if several children decide to go to camp.

FINANCE COMMITTEE:

PRESENT: Kathy Richardson, treasurer; Russ Shannon, Council Chair; Jerry Bower, Lay Leader; Helen Nelson,

at-large member.

ABSENT: Pastor Wiley, Bev Fink.

OLD BUSINESS: There was no old business to consider.

NEW BUSINESS:

REVIEW SPREADSHEETS: As usual, Kathy led us through the spreadsheets. We noted that all of our bills are current and none are outstanding. We observed that Trinity has again paid its apportionments in full. Paying them monthly has worked well. The special Christmas offering netted \$930.00; that's terrific. This will be divided between Lydia's House and Passages. The Lydia's House "blue bucket" campaign stood at \$927.00, with one more Sunday to go. We should be able easily to achieve our \$1,000.00 goal/pledge. We noted that we have paid \$34,302.72 to Edge contractors for roof replacement at the parsonage (done) and at the church (still to be done. That amount covers all of the work at the parsonage and one-third of the amount that the church roof will cost. We will need to find someone to do the work on the steeple, as Edge has passed on that work. Kathy will ask John, chair of Trustees for copies of the roofing contracts. Kathy has paid one-half of the property tax on the parsonage. The remainder is due in July. After discussion, Kathy moved and Helen seconded that Trinity cancel its advertising contracts with the Richland Observer and with the Shopping News. We decided we could do without those weekly ads, now that our website is up and running. This will "save" about \$75.00 per month.

CONTRIBUTION ENVELOPES: We reviewed how the new envelopes are working with the counters and with Kathy. Kathy said that most of the initial problems have been worked out. We discussed at length how long the used envelopes should be kept. Presently, they have been retained for seven years. The problem is that, occasionally, someone "snoops" in the old envelopes and can see how much someone is contributing. We eventually agreed that the old envelopes did not need to be retained and that Kathy should have them destroyed. Current envelopes will be kept for a time and then discarded. Meantime, they will be stored in a safe that the Trustees will purchase. This safe will be lockable.

OTHER ACCOUNTS:

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT TO GENERAL FUND DONATIONS: These totaled \$10,000.00 in 2018, a significant decrease from 2017.

MEMORIAL FUNDS: The Scholarship account balance is \$8,004.63. Undesignated funds are \$1,179.79. The designated funds stand at \$3,923.93.

SENIOR MYF/CAMPING: Balance is \$3,532.93.

MOPS: Balance of \$296.90.

TRINITY & PEACE YOUTH ACCOUNT: Has \$903.60.

PASTOR'S LOVE FUND: Balance is down to \$670.08. We noted that Pastor

Wiley is making good use of the Love Fund and, for him to continue, additional donations should be requested. Kathy will ask Wiley to write a statement for the Postings to request more money. At he end we decided that the special Easter offering should all go to the Love Fund.


