The Most Important Commandments of the Law

Dear Members of Peace and Trinity UMC:

One of the teachers of the Law came to Jesus and heard Jesus and others debating. The interpreter of the Law, noticing that Jesus had given them a good answer, asked him, "Of all the commandments, which is the most important?" "The most important one," answered Jesus, "It is this: "Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: Love your neighbor as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these." "Well said, teacher," the man replied. "You are right in saying that God is one and there is no other but Him. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding, and with all your strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself is more important than all burnt offerings and sacrifices." Jesus said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." (Mark 12:28-34). The gospel of Mark tells us about this incident when Jesus was asked about the first and most important commandment of the Law.

The love for God and neighbors, according to Charles Guignebert, is necessary to extend this love toward those who refuse to accept our love and therefore, by refusing to accept our love, they attempt to harm us. So, the love for God and the love for neighbors are essential commandments for us to keep in touch with the source of power, God. Also, this is a demonstration of the type of religious practice we must follow up with, which is according to God's instructions.

Finally, this teacher of the Law received the Lord's answers, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." Being far or near doesn't matter. What really is important is to be in the kingdom. To belong to the kingdom and become an active participant in His kingdom is what really matters. It could be considered as tragic being near the kingdom and at the end of life discovering that we do not belong to it. Life in the kingdom is manifested when we love God. It means we enjoy having fellowship with Him, and a strong desire to know more about Him. As we learn more about His divine will we decide to trust and obey Him more and more. Loving God and loving our neighbors is the commandment that will never wither, or get older and obsolete.

The kingdom manifestation is demonstrated by the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. It is based on the love God has for us and the love we direct toward God and our neighbors. This love is the only sacrifice acceptable to God and we may do well to extend this love to all our neighbors.

I hope you enjoy this season with both outside and inside home activities and enjoy the beauty of God's creation. Please, do not miss church service this coming communion Sunday. It is time to return home for spiritual nourishment and Christian fellowship.

From Despair to Hope

Today our world is facing crises on an unprecedented scale: war, genocide, poverty, hunger, disease, and global warming. Saddened by the state of the world, overwhelmed by the scope of these problems, and anxious about the future, we believe God calls us and equips us to respond.

Harsh economic conditions have made it impossible for the world's poor to break the ongoing cycle of despair and exploitation. The disparity between rich and poor has grown. Global financial improvement has not affected many of those living on the margins of society.

Ongoing wars and intractable conflicts and political strife and repressive conditions have led to the disregard for international law and the breakdown of international cooperation. Human rights continue to be violated and disregarded. These and related changes taking place in our global community diminish our hope for potential future reductions in military expenditures. Global military spending, totaling \$1.75 trillion in 2013 (Stockholm International Peace Research Institute Yearbook), drains resources of money and talent that might be used for meeting urgent social needs, long-term sustainable social and human development, and protecting God's creation.

We have realized that we live in a broken world. We are challenged by acts of intolerance and aggression, by acts of racism and xenophobia, by acts of classism, sexism, ageism, and gender discrimination. God's beautiful universe and all that was good in creation are in danger of extinction by unsafe and unsound environmental practices. HIV/AIDS continues to escalate to pandemic proportions. Malaria and tuberculosis remain urgent concerns, even as new and deadly viruses like Ebola ravage communities around the world.

We must renew our call for a social transformation, for the quest to open the doors of opportunity for all, to distribute resources more equitably, and to provide better care for persons in need.



Instead, they were actively preparing for the promised gift of the Holy Spirit. They "all joined together constantly in prayer" (Acts 1:14, NIV) and took steps to replace Judas.

After that inward focus, the disciples were ready to boldly burst forth on Pentecost, empowered and "enabled" (Acts 2:4) by the Spirit. They proclaimed Christ's death and resurrection, leading 3,000 people to faith that day, now known as the church's birthday.
